2013 Boundary Claim Trust

Seeking Youth Trustee Member Term: January 1, 2019 to December 31, 2021

Nipissing First Nation members who meet the following conditions are eligible to apply for the <u>vouth seat</u> on the Board of Trustees for the NFN 2013 Boundary Claim Trust:

- Must be at least 18 years of age as of the date of his or her appointment as a Nipissing Trustee;
- Must have completed high school or equivalency (GED);
- Must not be a member of Council as of the date of his or her appointment as a Nipissing Trustee;
- Must not have been declared to be mentally incompetent by a court of competent jurisdiction in Canada or elsewhere up to the time of applying for the position of Nipissing Trustee;
- Must not have been convicted of an offence under the Criminal Code of Canada that is an indictable offence or a dual offence which the Crown elected to proceed by way of indictment in the five year period immediately prior to applying for the position of Nipissing Trustee;
- Must not have been declared bankrupt pursuant to provisions of the Bankruptcy Act in the five year period immediately prior to applying for the position of Nipissing Trustee;
- Must not have been convicted of an offence under such laws relating to the possession, possession for the purpose of trafficking, or trafficking of a prohibited drug in the five year period immediately prior to applying for the position of Nipissing Trustee; and
- The individual must agree in writing ot become a party to, and be bound by, the terms of the Trust Agreement and to faithfully and to the best of his or her abilities carry out the duties of Nipissing Trustee by signing a Nipissing Undertaking of a Trustee's Certificate.

Interested Nipissing members shall provide the following information: A current detailed resumé, a statement declaring that you are not in undischarged bankruptcy or insolvency, and a current Certified Criminal Records Check.

Beautification Update

The Beautification program is coming to an end on December 7th and has successfully completed many projects and tasks across our communities this season, including:

- **Assessing** various projects to determine the scope of work
- Assisting with deliveries to the Food Bank and dismantling the Teaching Lodge
- Building a driveway at the Gtigewin Community Garden; railings for the walkway at the Outdoor Rink in Garden Village; shelving for the Pow Wow grounds; and storage cabinets and work benches for the Public Works garage



- Clearing & cutting fallen trees along roadways
- Installing guard rails on Ted Commanda Drive, flags at the Cenotaph, service doors for the Zamboni, snow fencing at the Nipissing Ojibway Daycare playground and at the Pow Wow grounds; as well as temporary fencing for falling snow and ice at the Outdoor Rink in Garden Village.

across NFN, such as painting rink boards and repairing rink
doors in Duchesnay; waterproofing walls and diverting water
at the Maintenance Garage; improving roads by addressing
culverts, potholes and levelling; performing repairs at our
Pump Houses; and maintaining walkways and landscaping at
the Administration Office.



 Preparing facilities and equipment for the winter season, including framing and installing concrete and railings for the new Zamboni entrance in Garden Village; winterizing small engine equipment used by the program; and applying sand & salt to roads and walkways.



 Removing garbage and debris across NFN lands and rail beds, including reporting illegal dumping and assisting in the apprehension of one suspect.



This program offers NFN members another option to finance the construction of a new home, or to purchase or renovate an existing home on NFN through the **Caisse Populaire Alliance Verner.**

This program is offered in addition to the NFN Housing Loan and RBC On-Reserve Lending programs, with each program offering eligible band members with loans of up to \$300,000 to build or purchase a home on reserve, or up to \$100,000 to refinance for renovations when a mortgage is in place.

QUICK FACTS

Cannabis became legal on October 17, 2018 and can be purchased online.

On April 1, 2019 private retail stores will be legal across Ontario. First Nations can approve or opt out of stores and deliveries, and may form agreements with the Attorney General with respect to regulating, licensing and authorizing retail stores on-reserve.

We need to hear from you on a number of issues related to the legalization of cannabis to determine our next steps.

Students from Nbisiing participated in various activities throughout Treaties Recognition Week this year. We were lucky enough to attend Nipissing University and hear from Chief Scott McLeod, Grand Chief of Anishinabek Nation Glen Hare, Maurice Switzer, and Kelly Crawford among others on the importance of honouring the treaties and Treaties Recognition Week.



Leadership & Post-Secondary Pathways

Recently, University bound students from Nbisiing attended the **Debwendizon Indigenous Youth Education Gathering at Nipissing University**. The program allowed students to experience university life as well as to explore the various departments at the University.

Students were given the opportunity to engage in activities in the Phys Ed Department, Nursing Department, Library, and in the Residences. They had the opportunity to meet with students and professors from several departments, including the Office of Indigenous Initiatives.

Each year, the **Aboriginal Post-Secondary Information Program** visits Nbisiing to meet students and provide information regarding post-secondary opportunities to our students. Over 40 students attended the information session in order to broaden their perspective on the possibilities for post-secondary education.

As well, eight students attended the Open House at the **Anishinabek Educational Institute**. At the Open House, students were given a tour and had the opportunity to discuss post-secondary options at AEI.



Nbisiing students attended the **Grand Opening of "The Village,**" which is a new addition to the Canadore College Campus. They were impressed with the new Indigenous facilities that will be available to students who attend Canadore in the future.

The students in the "Designing Your Future" course had the opportunity to take the "Rent Smart" program, which is beneficial to anyone who will ever be a tenant or a landlord. This certificate program is recognized by landlords as an asset when students are applying for an apartment.

News from the Wellness Lead

Moon Teachings - Monthly Moon Teachings are well-underway, with November being Freezing Moon. Students were reminded of being prepared for long winter months (collecting firewood, ensuring that we check in on our Elders and family members in need, checking on our own Mental Health, as Seasonal Depression can set in with lowered amounts of Vitamin D from the sun), what stories are told during the Winter, as well as how we use the Stars to guide us during hunting/trapping seasons and some stories tied to the Stars.



We will be having our Little Spirit Moon (December) teaching before we are off for Christmas Break. The focus will be on Healers and Seers (how we can recognize our own gifts, trusting our intuition, collecting our oral traditions and histories pertaining to healing and seeing, and exploring the concept of Molecular Memory).

We will also discuss how to feed our Spirit with goodness and positive energy to help us get through the Winter months, until the days start to get longer after the Winter Solstice (December 21st).

Building Our Bundles - November is also the roll-out month for a program designed by the Wellness Lead that provides and reinforces our teachings and how they are tied to our Well-being. This program focuses on building a "bundle" with each student, the bundle being a booklet with teachings about self. These topics include: The 5 Parts of Self, The 7 Stages of Life, Medicine Wheel teachings, Identity. Booklets are available to each student, and parents can request a copy as well.

Treaties Recognition Week Recap

A number of events were held from November 5-9 as part of Treaties Recognition Week. Chief Scott McLeod spoke at an event held at the Nipissing University Library on November 5. This event also included Maurice Switzer, Kelly Crawford and Mike Restoule, who has dedicated a great deal of time and commitment to ensure both levels of government live up to their part of the treaty.

In an effort to continue promoting learning opportunities, Catherine Murton Stoehr, Ph.D - a professor at Nipissing University, writer for the

Anishinabek News and local activist- will be teaching a history course over the winter entitled: Indigenous Treaties in Canada.

The course will feature Mike Restoule, of Nipissing First Nation on the Robinson Huron Treaty; Dan Shaule of Garden River Ojibway Nation on the Williams Treaty; Alan Odjig Corbiere of M'Chigeeng on the 1862 Manitoulin Island Treaty; and Maurice Switzer of Mississaugas of the New Credit on treaties and reconciliation.

Some of the courses will be held off-campus so that they are more accessible to community members who would like to attend and help to inform the discussion. Children are always welcome.

A pamphlet with meeting times and specific topics will be circulated in early December. Watch the NFN Administration Facebook page for details.

The intent of the course is to lay a path forward to by helping participants understand treaties (and the conditions under which they were made) in order to move closer to reconciliation. Please contact Catherine for details at mstoehr@nipissingu.ca.



Preparing for Bi-Boon - A Teaching about Winter

As we live through the thirteen grandmother moons during the year, we are now in the time of hardship. Mdaabmini Giizis, (Corn Moon-September), Binaakwi Giizis (Falling Leaves Moon October), mina Mtigmeg Giizis (Whitefish Moon-November) is the time we start to put things away, preparing for the long winter, known as BOON.

This was especially true for our ancestors, even our grandparents as we have witnessed in our lifetime. Our ancestors would all go back to the sugar camps and they would go and retrieve all the birch bark tubs, which were full of maple candy and syrup.. In Mdaabmini Giizis, September. all the hunters would go out and the animals would give their lives to the hunters who needed them, so that nishnaabe would survive another winter. The kwewag would smoke all the meat, put the meat away and get ready for the mshkawding is coming. So the falling leaves are happening and the mshkawding is November and that's the time we're getting ready to go to the winter goomosgewag (camps). So this goes on like 28 days each. We have December, January and February. January is the Creator's moon.

Kizhemnidoo Myaaowsaan kina gegoo. Kizhwemnidoo kina gegoo bi-mi yaayaang waamdaan yaayaangwaamdaan kina ebimizhiwebak kina anishinaabeg gewiin gaa-bikendaaswaad maajii bi maadzid. Mii dash enji-madbiyang geyaaba.

He is the one that takes care of everything and everyone, all of creation. He is the one who takes care of all that is happening. This is why we are still here today.

There are two spirit moons. Giizsoons manidoo is what we know as January — the time when we talk about Boon. Why do we call it that? Boon. Do you know what that means? It means death. Niizhwag aanish geniin enso biboonezyan? Aanish giin enso biboonenzyan? You hear that? Boon. Boon-enz-yan. Aanish giin enso biboonenzyan? I'm asking how many winters have you survived? We don't say years we say Aanish giin enso biboonenzyan? How many winters did you survive? Not so much now because we don't even have cut wood anymore. We just turn up our thermostat if it gets too cold. If we run out of food we just go to the store.

But in the time of our ancestors these moons were very important because if they didn't do this preparation work... if they didn't follow those moon cycles, they would never survive the wintertime. In Creator's moon, there is a time of cleansing. Only the fittest survive. Because when Chi-boon comes... Chi-boon is manidoo ga'awi'ya gewiin a- manidoowi mshkaawzii... mshkaawzii kina gegoo bebiintoon ebimiyaat. Spirit is strong. He cleans the way.

If you're not prepared for that creator's moon then you'll be taken to the spirit world and that's why it's called Boon. And even the ayaa Shkakmikwe (mother earth) goes to sleep too. All the plant life goes to sleep, even ninaatig goes to sleep, all the wiigwaas goes to sleep, miinan goes to sleep, everything goes to sleep. Boon.
